## Remembering Slavery 2007

This year marks the 200th anniversary of the Parliamentary Act to abolish the slave trade in the British colonies. To commemorate the bicentenary, museums and galleries across the North East have put together a fascinating programme of events, exhibitions and lectures, which will appeal to visitors of all ages and interests.

The Parliamentary Act was passed on 25 March 1807 and marked the beginning of the long journey to the eventual abolition of slavery within the British Empire in 1833. Even then, enslaved Africans did not gain their freedom until 1838, and it took a further 50 years before slavery was officially abolished in the Americas in 1888.

The effects of the slave trade still resonate today. The Remembering Slavery 2007 programme will reveal the history of the trans-Atlantic slave trade and highlight contemporary forms of slavery. It will also uncover the links the North East and its people had with the slave trade.

Black History Month is celebrated each October and this year it is made even more significant by the bicentenary. Look out for a range of events around this time.

Remembering Slavery 2007 is a national initiative funded by Renaissance North East, MLA Partnership, Heritage Lottery Fund, Northern Rock Foundation and Tyne & Wear Museums Business Partners.

African Textiles

Remembering Slavery touring exhibition 22 September – 11 November

Two exhibitions, displayed at Sunderland Museum & Winter Gardens, are touching on different aspects of the 2007 bicentenary.

African Textiles is a colourful exhibition of textile art created by artist Barbara Reed and the students and staff of Washington School. The exhibition, displayed in the Open Space at Sunderland Museum & Winter Gardens, includes a number of textiles which incorporate design motifs from West Africa.

The Remembering Slavery touring exhibition focuses on the trans-Atlantic slave trade and recalls the experiences of enslaved Africans as well as the hidden histories of North East people who were involved, both as supporters and critics of slavery. Also highlighted is the contribution to the abolition movement of the Sunderland-based campaigner, James Field Stanfield.

Drawn primarily from Tyne & Wear Museums' collections, this exhibition includes objects, photographs, paintings and documents relating to the slave trade which have never been displayed together before.

Behind many of the exhibits are the stories of real people's struggles in the 1800s, including the tale of Mary Ann Macham, a runaway slave from Virginia who escaped to North Shields in 1831. She married a local rope-maker called James Blyth and lived in North Shields until her death in 1893.

## Laing Art Gallery, Newcastle

#### La Bouche du Roi 10 November - 3 February 2008

La Bouche du Roi is a remarkable multi-media artwork created between 1997 and 2005 by Romuald Hazoumé, an artist from the Republic of Benin, West Africa.

Literally translated as 'The Mouth of the King', the title refers to a place in Bénin from where many thousands of enslaved Africans were transported to the Americas and the Caribbean.

La Bouche du Roi is primarily a warning against all kinds of human greed, exploitation and enslavement, both historical and contemporary. The installation is made up of many different elements and stimulates the senses with a number of sights, sounds and smells linked to the trans-Atlantic slave trade.

The exhibition also includes a film showing the motorcyclists who transport petrol illegally between Nigeria and the Republic of Benin. They carry plastic petrol cans of the type Hazoumé has turned into masks.

La Bouche du Roi has been recently acquired by the British Museum with the assistance of the Art Fund, the UK's leading independent art charity, and the British Museum Friends. The UK tour to Hull, Liverpool, Bristol, London and Newcastle is funded by Arts Council England, with additional support from the Dorset Foundation.

Fling out the Anti-Slavery Flag Newcastle Libraries Local Studies and Family History Centre, Civic Centre

Using historical documents from the Newcastle City's Local Studies and Family History Centre, the Lit and Phil's Writer in Residence, Sheree Mack, and Newcastle Libraries present a unique exhibition detailing the effect of the slave trade on Newcastle. The exhibition focuses on the extensive collection of tracts held by Newcastle Libraries in an attempt to uncover the involvement of the North East region and its people in both the slave trade and its abolition.

Slavery: Ancient and Modern Museum of Antiquities, Newcastle

Uncovering the nature of slavery in the ancient and early modern worlds, this exhibition explores these two eras of the slave trade and highlights similarities between the different periods.

## The Triangular Trade Shipley Art Gallery, Gateshead

The Shipley Art Gallery offers a unique glimpse of the way African people were viewed by Europeans in the 1700s and early 1800s. Pictures and decorative art from the gallery's collections will be displayed revealing, for the first time, their hidden connections to the slave trade. A collection of Fairtrade goods from the 21st century is also on display and will focus on modern day forms of slavery and exploitation.

#### 29 September – 31 October

Campaigning Against Slavery, from the 18th to the 21st century Sunderland City Library and Arts Centre

This informative exhibition takes audiences on a visual journey through history from the time of the trans-Atlantic slave trade to slavery in contemporary society. Organised by Anti-Slavery International, the exhibition looks at how slavery has been challenged through popular campaigning.






