'A Man and a Brother?'

The abolition of the slave trade: the Hampshire perspective

This exhibition has been arranged to mark the bicentenary of the Abolition of the Slave Trade Act of 1807, which sought to bring to an end British involvement in the transatlantic slave trade. It includes a selection of the sources relating to slavery and the slave trade held by Hampshire Record Office in Winchester, and by Hampshire County Museums Service. It does not seek to draw definitive conclusions about this immense topic, but the following suggestions may help anyone who would like to investigate further.

Original sources in Hampshire:

The archive collections held in Hampshire Record Office include, within the papers of Hampshire families and organisations, a great variety of relevant documents. These include papers relating to the abolition campaign such as letters of Lord Calthorpe, a philanthropist and friend of notable abolitionists such as William Wilberforce, and the papers of William of Curtis of Alton who, like many fellow-Quakers in Hampshire, was involved in local petitioning campaigns. There are also title deeds and estate papers relating to plantations owned by Hampshire families such as the Dewars of Hurstbourne Tarrant. The catalogue can be searched online at http://www.hants.gov.uk/record-office/catalog/index.html - please note that documents are not necessarily indexed under broad themes such as slavery: you will also be able to find relevant material by entering names of individual colonies, abolitionists, and so on. The extensive holdings of parish registers and wills include entries relating to black servants including ex-slaves, owners of slave ships, and those involved in related activities; a few such entries have been included in the exhibition, but it is likely that others remain to be discovered.

Local newspapers, such as the *Hampshire Chronicle*, *Hampshire Telegraph* and *Hampshire Advertiser* (based in Winchester, Portsmouth and Southampton respectively) are a very useful source of information about the local debate concerning the slave trade and slavery. The *Chronicle* (from 1772 onwards) and the *Advertiser* (1823-1900) can be seen on microfilm in the Local Studies Collection in the Reference Library in Winchester; the *Telegraph* can be seen at Waterlooville Library (1779-1868), Portsmouth Library (1799 onwards) and Gosport Library (1803-1873)
