#### The Brookes

The plan of the Brookes was commissioned by anti-slavery supporters to draw attention to the horrific conditions suffered by the slaves on the voyage from Africa to the Americas - the socalled Middle Passage.

The space allowed for each slave was as follows:

men 6 feet by 1ft 4 inches women 5 ft by 1ft 4 inches boys 5ft by 1ft 2 inches

girls 4 ft 6 in by 1ft 2 inches

The journey across the Atlantic took at least six weeks. During this time, slaves were rarely allowed above deck, the men were often shackled together to prevent escape or rebellion and water and food were in short supply. Not surprisingly, many slaves perished on the journey.

# Durham University Library

Durham University Library is also home to our archives and special collections. We have books and documents going back to the fourteenth century. The image of the slave ship Brookes which forms the focus of the event today can be found in one of the books in our collection. Anyone is welcome to visit the Library on Palace Green to look at the archives and special collections. #### Durham Cathedral

Durham Cathedral is the greatest Norman building in England, perhaps even in Europe. It is cherished not only for its architecture but also for its incomparable setting. For this reason it was inscribed together with the Castle as one of Britain's first World Heritage Sites. In a nationwide BBC poll held in 2001 it was voted the nation's best-loved building. The aim of the Education Service is to provide activities and resources that support RE and the National Curriculum. We employ methods and hands-on activities that will present Durham Cathedral as a unique educational resource and one which can not be replicated in the classroom!

# Changing Perspectives

### Stockton Museum

Based at Preston Hall Museum, the Education team run a wide variety of activities including history, art and science workshops, object and costume handling sessions and also offer a loans box service. This year they are also involved in a project called 'Manacles and Money' which is looking at slavery and its legacy in the Tees Valley. This project will culminate in a multi-media exhibition at Preston Hall Museum from mid-October.
