



In remembering the Act of Parliament we honour those who were enslaved, who stood up and rebelled to bring the slave trade to an end. We acknowledge that the abolition of this trade could only have taken place by the collaboration of all the decent peoples of conscience and goodwill, caught-up in the practice of slavery. The British Parliamentary Act did not bring about an end to slavery itself. This abhorrent industry still exists in many forms around the world today. In commemorating the passing of the Act of 1807 we in Haringey indicate our acceptance of a continuing responsibility to oppose the enslavement of one human being by another, and so further the healing process.

I am proud to endorse this programme for Black History Month 2007, both as a person with an African-Caribbean-European-American background; and as the borough's first citizen.
