Churches Together in England is heading up a Project to mark the bicentenary of 1807 Abolition of the Slave Trade Act. These are its aims

Highlighting values

showing the relevance of the abolitionists' values today

Telling the story

fully, accurately, sensitively from all perspectives, black and white about the slave trade and the abolitionists

Explaining the legacy

explaining the legacy of injustice and racism valuing one another's experience motivating people to take remedial action

Encouraging openness

helping churches to be safe space for honest exchange enabling church leaders to develop the process

Raising awareness

of current campaigns for a just world of corporate responsibility of modern slaveries

Stimulating reflection

on the spirituality and motivation of the abolitionists on the personal sacrifice to be made for justice, on our personal capacity to effect change, on what it means to be made in the image of God, on how we do justice and love mercy on repentance, respect, reconciliation, redemption

Modelling good practice

inclusiveness diversity openness transparency honesty

Working with others

building alliances across the Christian spectrum collaborating with secular organisations

Finance - The Project Director's salary is being supported by the Jerusalem Trust. Other costs are being met by the Churches and agencies. Additional substantial finds are needed to give the Project the capacity to have a public profile, to commission educational resources, to highlight the themes and achieve the objectives identified.

The Project Director

Richard Reddie has been appointed Project Director, with effect from late March.

Richard will be dealing at a senior level with a broad range of Churches and communities, media, educationalists, legislators and opinion-formers, agencies and organisations concerned with racial justice and modern forms of slavery. He is a staff member of CTE and is supported by a Project Executive chaired by Revd Dr Inderjit Bhogal, OBE.

For the past two years Richard Reddie has been Education Policy Officer for Race On The Agenda (ROTA). He has worked with "hard to reach" communities and has a special concern for BME children and academic under-



achievement. For the previous six years he was an Information officer at the Evangelical Alliance. He edits Focus, the periodical of the African and Caribbean Evangelical Alliance. He has a BA in Caribbean Studies and Spanish, and an MA in Information Management.

The Project Director will

- be the contact-point with government and secular bodies.
- work with heritage, museum and cultural services.
- promote news coverage and encourage programmemakers.
- help smaller organisations and campaigning groups to increase their capacity.
- convene and assist in events bigger than what any single group can undertake.
- assist in the production of educational materials, especially through the development of a website.
- encourage theological reflection in the areas of justice, reconciliation, reparation and redemption.
- coordinate the provision of study, liturgical and devotional materials, especially relating to Lent 2007.
