Gateshead commemorates the 200th anniversary of the Parliamentary Act to abolish the transatlantic slave trade by taking a closer look at African and Caribbean culture past and present.

For centuries people of African and Caribbean origin have lived in Europe. They came for many reasons, some as royalty and ambassadors, but many as slaves and servants, bringing with them their own unique customs and cultures. Their contributions to cultural life are far-reaching, spanning a whole range of artistic expression. Sugar & Spice Festival will celebrate the work of local, national and international black artists and the richness they bring to communities.

Sugar & Spice Festival takes place in October 2007 during Black History Month. A large theatre pavilion and a marketplace arena will be built on Mill Road against the dramatic backdrop of Gateshead Quays overlooking the Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art and the Gateshead Millennium Bridge.


Sounds of Freedom

In the run up to Sugar & Spice Festival this unique series of three concerts offers the opportunity to hear classical music composed by former slaves and other black composers. Spanning the 200 years from abolition to the present the music is engaging, approachable and often very moving.

The programmes show that whilst these composers were influenced by the Western classical traditions they heard around them, they also brought their own musical traditions to their compositions, giving their music a unique voice.

Maxine Franklin attracted attention from the international music world with recitals, South Bank, London also received enthusiastic press reviews, praising her 'authority and individuality as an interpreter over a wide range of piano music' (Daily Telegraph).

Maxine has received acclaim for her sensitivity as an artist and her individuality and authority as a performer. In recent years she has focused particularly on piano works of composers from Africa and the African Diaspora. She has performed these pieces widely, but especially in the US.

This concert will include pieces by William Grant Still and Juan Francisco Garcia.

'Healing'

Gabisile Nkosi is currently the Community Programmes Co-ordinator for the Caversham Centre for Artists and Writers in KwaZulu Natal, South Africa. She uses her art to build confidence and skills in her community whilst exploring her own unique vision as an artist. She enables her community to 'engage the spirit' - helping to heal through nurturing self-confidence and self-belief, whilst facing the challenges of pervasive poverty and the HIV Aids pandemic.

Gabisile's exhibition 'Healing' echoes this need to establish balance through an integration of the spiritual and the physical. The prints use metaphors and symbolism, sharing emotions and life experiences with force and vigour. This is done in a way that is sometimes humourous, sometimes joyful, often painful, but ultimately uplifting.

It is fitting that this exhibition is part of the bicentennial commemoration of the abolition of the slave trade. Gabisile grew up under the apartheid regime, witnessing the 'beating heart' of liberation. Recognising the past, helping to realise the potential of the present and by taking responsibility for the future, she helps to build a legacy of pride based on compassion and dignity.

Sent back ten years later by his employers, Walker is horrified to find that he must destroy the very leaders he created... A damning commentary on the situation in Vietnam and the very nature of 'freedom', Brando is electrifying in this role. An unmissable curio.

Miriam Makeba

Monday 8th October 7.30pm



We are absolutely thrilled to welcome Miriam Makeba to open the Sugar & Spice Festival. Renowned worldwide for her music and her work for human rights. She spent many years in exile from her native South Africa because of apartheid, suffered from censorship of her work and eventually had her citizenship revoked for speaking out and singing about the human rights atrocities at the time.

She sought refuge in the UK and USA where she became part of the growing civil rights movement in the 1960s. Her marriage to Black Panthers leader Stokely Carmichael in 1968 caused controversy in the United States causing record deals and tours to be cancelled. In 1990 she finally returned to her native South Africa.

In 2005 Makeba started a 14 month worldwide farewell tour, giving concerts in all of the countries she visited during her working life. Miriam Makeba is African music's first and foremost world star, a pioneer whose early songs blended different styles long before anyone even began to talk about "world music". Do not miss what may be her last live performance ever!

Prior to Miriam Makeba, praise poet Nkosana Mpofu will give a short reading of his poetry. Nkosana, who now lives and works in the North East, writes in Ndebele, Zulu and English and his work documents his life and experiences.

Over the years Maseko has collaborated with musicians from around the world. His refusal to follow musical conventions has made him an ambassador of progressive African roots music.

Touches of reggae, flamenco, zouk, salsa and cubano collide to create this Afro rumba soukous style. This is African hip-swinging music at its best.

Mary Seacole (The Opera)

Mary Seacole was a remarkable woman – a Jamaican healer who worked in terrible conditions administering emergency medicine to soldiers from both sides in the thick of the Crimean battlefield.

A heroine in her own time, Mary Seacole's virtues have often been overshadowed by the achievements of Florence Nightingale but her fascinating and astonishing life story is now being uncovered.

The mould-breaking spirit of Mary Seacole is at the heart of this vibrant new opera produced by Gyenyame for Performing Arts. Founder and artistic director of Gyenyame, Larry Coke, has worked at the Royal Opera House for over 30 years and is the force behind this multi-cultural company.

The work fuses Caribbean musical influences with existing Western operatic traditions, creating an inspiring and innovative theatre work. Gyenyane's singers, led by soprano Hyacinth Nicholl as Seacole, will be joined by the Caedmon Sinfonietta, an orchestra drawn from professionals based in the region.

The opera is being revived especially for the Sugar & Spice Festival. It was first performed to great acclaim in 2000 to packed houses at the Lindbury Theatre, Royal Opera House.

Gyenyame for Performing Arts will also deliver a programme of workshops about the life of Mary Seacole to community groups and schools.

Professor Elizabeth Anionwu will describe the life and achievements of Mary Seacole (1805-1881), the Jamaican nurse who overcame discrimination to fund her own passage to care for soldiers during the Crimean War.

She will also provide an update about the Mary Seacole Memorial Statue Appeal and then respond to questions and comments from the audience.

Elizabeth is Emeritus Professor of Nursing at Thames Valley University where she recently retired as Head of the Mary Seacole Centre for Nursing Practice. She is also Vice Chairperson of the Mary Seacole Memorial Statue Appeal (www.maryseacoleappeal.org.uk) and author of 'A short history of Mary Seacole' published by the Royal College of Nursing in 2005.

Abram Wilson & The Delta Blues Project, featuring London Community Gospel Choir Roll Jordan Roll

Sunday 14th October 7.30pm

Roll Jordan Roll is a must for all those who love jazz, blues and gospel music.

The very first public performances of African-American music in Britain took place as long ago as 1873. The Fisk Jubilee Singers – a group of freed slaves from Tennessee – became a national sensation. Their concerts drew vast crowds around the country and they sang for Gladstone and the Royal Family. Queen Victoria was so moved by their voices that she commissioned the Singers' portrait. Today it hangs in Fisk University in Nashville, which was built with the proceeds of their historic tours.

Roll Jordan Roll celebrates these extraordinary events from the perspective of the Jubilee Singers themselves, incorporating first hand accounts, personal stories and songs. The Jubilee Singers' sheet music archive of spirituals inspired this suite of new works by composers, Abram Wilson and Nicky Brown.

Dramatised through performance and narration, *Roll Jordan Roll* will focus on the Singers' first trip to London and the explosive impact they had on British society. Their original song material – spirituals and slave songs – are arranged and interpreted for contemporary audiences. Led by Abram Wilson with a ten-piece band and The London Community Gospel Choir this will be a powerful musical drama telling a remarkable true story.

Black Voices are a collective of powerful women's voices, born and nurtured in the black church. Their new programme, *Spiritual Journey*, takes them into a new dimension and is an uplifting programme of a cappella song charting the development of gospel singing.

One of the greatest art forms to emerge from the Atlantic slave trade was the Negro spiritual. Spirituals, slave folklore, and slave songs were an essential survival tool, providing relief during hard labour and encouragement in times of loneliness, uniting slave communities and fuelling determination to re-gain freedom.



Gateshead connections with the transatlantic slave trade

Sheree Mack is the Sugar & Spice Festival writer in residence. As part of her research with communities she is collecting stories that make a connection between Gateshead and the transatlantic slave trade.

The following is an excerpt from 'The Crowley Legacy' by Sheree Mack. The full story will be on display in the Sugar & Spice Marketplace at the Big Weekend, where you can meet Sheree and hear other anecdotes and stories.



My mother called our grandmother, Mama. And in the morning she would say to us after breakfast, 'Go say goodbye to mama'. We went to school, came back, played, fought, had dinner and then mother said, 'Go stoke the fire in the dining room and talk to Mama.' I remember those nights clearly. But what grandmother talked about, I cannot recall. I thought she was just going over the past. I couldn't wait to get back to my Gothic novels, to pay enough attention. Now we know that she was talking, reliving these stories as a way of telling the true stories to my mother.

On the night itself, the wind was howling. There was a tremendous draft coming into the dining room. The fire wouldn't keep burning. Mother stayed with grandmother through the night, to keep the fire alive. It must have been late by the time grandmother told her the secrets because everyone else was in bed.

Mother was sitting by Mama. They began to talk about the past, the family, the business. The talk shifted to stories that Mother has never heard before. She listened with gathering bewilderment and alarm to finally this was said:- 'And so with trade dropping off with the Navy, we started to manufacture hoes for Barbados plantations and the chains for slave ships.'
