



Black and Asian Sources in the Suffolk Record Office

PARISH REGISTERS

There have been people from Africa, the Caribbean and South Asia living in Suffolk since at least the seventeenth century. One of the best sources of information about them before the twentieth century, and a starting-point for further research, is the Church of England parish registers of baptisms, marriages and burials. There is a list of entries found to date in an Appendix at the end of this leaflet. Very little work has been done on tracing the early history of the black presence in Suffolk, and more references probably remain to be discovered in parish registers.

PAPERS OF FAMILIES WHO OWNED PROPERTY IN, OR TRADED WITH, THE WEST INDIES AND THE AMERICAN SOUTH

A number of Suffolk land-owners also owned plantations in the West Indies or the southern United States. Many of the coloured men and women who appear tantalisingly in the eighteenth century parish registers had been brought to this country from the plantations to act as servants in their masters' Suffolk homes. The families' archives often include records of the administration of those estates – information which can assist research into the wider context of coloured people's history. In addition the Record Office holds some records of trade between this country and the West Indies.

SLAVERY AND ANTI-SLAVERY

These estates in the West Indies were dependent for their prosperity on slaves. During the eighteenth century the institution of slavery came under increasing criticism, until in 1807 the British Parliament abolished the transatlantic slave trade; slavery itself was abolished throughout the British Empire in 1838. Suffolk can be proud of its role in the campaigns to achieve these reforms. One of the leading opponents of slavery was Thomas Clarkson of Playford Hall near Ipswich and as a result the Ipswich Local Studies collection contains many of Clarkson's anti-slavery books and pamphlets. Quite apart from Clarkson, slavery and its abolition had been live social, moral and political issues in Suffolk for many years.

References to people from Africa, the Caribbean and the Indian sub-continent in Suffolk parish registers, 17th to 19th centuries

Christianna Niger Anglice a blackamore, baptised Sibton, 25 December 1634

Robert Smith of York, a Blackamore and Trumpeter, buried Hadleigh, 14 April 1685

Rosanna a blackamore woman of Sir Robert Davers, baptised Rougham, 12 February1688

John son of John and Rosanita Blunt, blackamores, baptised Bury St Edmunds St Mary, 14 August 1690

John, son of John Blunt, Blackmoor, buried Bury St Edmunds St Mary, 16 August 1690

John son of John Blunt and Rosanna (Blacks), baptised Bury St Edmunds St Mary, 18 January 1692

Rachel the Moor's wife, buried Barningham, 28 December 1698

Peter le-Blacke, buried Barningham, 3 September 1701

Robert Yoxford a Black Boy brought over by Thomas Betts Esq, baptised Yoxford, 25 December 1713

Patrick Brink, blackamor, buried Bury St Edmunds St Mary, 17 September 1720

Thomas Rundell a negro, buried Bardwell, 22 February 1732

Wiliam Byrom (a blackamoor servant to Capt Rycart) and Sarah Knights, both of this parish, married by licence Aldeburgh, 16 August 1744

Joseph Moulton an Asiatic black of Madras in the Kingdom of Golconda aged about 17 years of age, servant to John Tompson Esq, late of Little Gadsden in Hertfordshire, baptised Beccles, 23 August 1745

Elizabeth Pickerell, wife of Isaac, a blackamor, buried Bury St Edmunds St Mary, 17 March 1748

Hannah, daughter of Henry Norbrook, a negro, and Hannah his wife baptised Tunstall, 29 September 1761

Stephen, a Negro Boy, about 9 years of age, surnamed Tucker, baptised Nayland, 26 November 1766

Mary Hellet a negro girl servant to Jonathan Worrell Esq, baptised Ipswich St Nicholas, 23 June 1768

William Strap a negro servant of Capt Pricke of Nacton, baptised Ipswich St Clement, 12 December 1771

Charles Cook, a black, aged 19 years, baptised Bury St Edmunds St James, 22 December 1773

Thomas German, a black and adult, baptised Great Saxham, 16 March 1777

Anthrobus Morgan, a black and adult, baptised Great Saxham, 1 November 1780

John son of – Solomon, a child brought from the East Indies and baptised at the age of 11 or 12 years, baptised Ipswich St Mary Quay, 26 January 1781

Hebebessom a native of India baptised aged 19, Brandeston, 22 May 1784

Harriot a native of India baptised aged 15, Brandeston, 22 May 1784

Joseph Dian a native Congo in Africa aged about 16 years, publicly baptised Henstead, 11 June 1784

Sigismunda Beckford, a native of Jamaica age 40 baptised Somerleyton, 28 October 1784

John Brown, a Black and native of Jamaica, aged 35 years, baptised Great Saxham, 23 April 1786

'the above John Brown buried' Great Saxham, 20 July 1786

William Luccan a child brought from the East Indies by Capt William Bullock in the year 1786, aged about ten years, baptised Mellis, 12 August 1787

'Ben Ali a native of Morocco aged between 50 and 60 years who being found dead in this parish and on whom the coroner having taken his inquest was admitted to Christian Burial', Higham, 2 November 1789

'A pauper an African' buried, Newmarket St Mary, 19 July 1805

John Friday (a black) buried, supposed to be about 66 years of age, 15 December 1811

Thomas son of Cuffey and Amber Cross, of Silent St, negro slaves, baptised Ipswich St Nicholas, 10 December 1815

Joshua Wise, an African, buried aged 19, Holbrook, 7 January 1826

'Thomas Alert a black boy recaptured from a Brazilian Brigantine by Captain Bosanquet near the River Gabon. He says his name is 'Macarb Entcheur'. This Brigantine was sent to [] in the Brazils where it was boarded by the inhabitants and all Indians the rebels carried off except this boy. he was returned to England and committed by the Sec of State to Mr Hoare by whom he was given over to the care of the vicar. He was christened in the regular way with the name Thomas. His other name was that of Captain Bosanquet's ship. He is supposed to have been 7 or 8 years old.'; baptised Lowestoft, 4 October 1846

James, native servant to His Highness Prince Duleep Singh, baptised, Elveden, 26 January 1867

Mary, Indian servant of the late Maharajah Prinjit Singh, baptised, Elveden, 26 January 1867

James Hurkar and Mary Chumbalie married, Elveden, 2 February 1867

Frederick Victor, son of Duleep and Bamba Singh, baptised, Elveden, 2 May 1868

Bamba Sophia, daughter of Duleep and Bamba Singh, baptised, Elveden, 19 December 1869

Catherine Hilda, daughter of Duleep and Bamba Singh, baptised, Elveden, 31 December 1871

Sophia Alexandra, daughter of Duleep and Bamba Singh, baptised, Elveden, 31 December 1876

Albert Edward Alexander, son of Duleep and Bamba Singh, baptised, Elveden, 18 April 1880
