Tuesday 27 February Slavery in the 21st century 7pm

Thursday 24 May Film: Ghostsby Nick Broomfield

6.30pm

Screened in 2006 as part of the London International Film Festival, this is Nick Broomfield's second fiction feature, inspired by the deaths of 23 Chinese cockle pickers in Morecambe Bay in 2004. The film traces one Chinese migrant as she tries to escape poverty in China by traveling to the UK, where she works in various exploitative jobs. Based on detailed research in both the UK and China and with a strong cast of non-actors, the film brings home powerfully the reality faced by thousands of migrants in the UK.
