



During slavery in the USA, there was a systematic effort to de-Africanise the captive Black workforce. As they were unable to express themselves freely in ways that were spiritually meaningful to them, enslaved Africans often held secret religious services. Worshippers engaged in African religious spirituals and crafted the impromptu musical expression of field songs into the intricate, multi-part harmonies of struggle. The secret knowledge of enslaved Africans developed their own storehouse of healing knowledge called the African Holocaust.
