Slave Trade Abolition in Cambridgeshire & Suffolk (STACS)

The STACS project is part of a national programme of education events and activities marking the 200th anniversary of the 1807 Abolition of the Slave Trade Act. STACS is managed by St John's College, Cambridge and funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. It aims to raise awareness of the highly significant, yet often overlooked role played by Thomas Clarkson and Olaudah Equiano within the slave trade abolition movement in East Anglia.

In the Summer Term enactors Patrick Nielsen and Stephanie Peddel worked with students at school to explore the roles of Clarkson and Equiano and produce performances for peers, the wider school community and family.

For tonight's event students have been asked to prepare a 15-minute presentation covering three areas;

Why should Thomas Clarkson be remembered?

(Exploring the need for a memorial to Clarkson in Ipswich)

How did Clarkson work with others?

(Acknowledging Clarkson's partnerships with local activists such as Olaudah Equiano, national organisers such as Granville Sharp and William Wilberforce and his efforts to campaign against the slave trade internationally. Recognising that the abolitionist movement was part of a complex history including slave resistance and other factors, which led to the success of the campaign)

How should Clarkson be remembered?

(Imagining what form would a memorial might take)

Three schools from Cambridge (Chesterton Community College, Cottenham Village College and Impington Village College) presented their ideas at a separate event. The best ideas from both Counties will be drawn together and presented to the fellows at St John's College in November

The final outcome of the STACS project will be the publication of new curriculum material, written by experienced educational writers and distributed to all schools in Cambridgeshire and Suffolk, with potential for a national launch in 2008. The schools presenting this evening have played an important role by helping to evaluate these materials
