2007 MARKS THE 200TH ANNIVERSARY of the passing of the Act of Parliament that legally ended British involvement in the trading of African people to serve as slave labour in the Americas, the West Indies and Europe.

This Act did not end slavery in the British Empire, nor did it end the involvement of British companies in the slave trade. 1807 did, however, mark the moment when men and women - privileged and poor, enslaved and free - celebrated their initial success against a barbaric trade.

To commemorate this anniversary the National Portrait Gallery has created a new gallery trail that highlights some of the individuals in the Collection who have been associated with the history of the slave trade in many different ways. It ends with a series of contemporary portraits of individuals who have an interest or involvement in preventing the existence of slavery today. The trail has been researched and written by Dr Caroline Bressey, University College, London.

Use the maps and key overleaf to find the relevant portraits in the Gallery and look out for the labels with the special logo to find out more about them.
