It explores the reasons why millions of Africans were forced into slavery and also the crucial role that the city of Liverpool played in that process.


The museum addresses the many contemporary legacies of the slave trade, for people living in Africa, the Caribbean, North and South America and western Europe.

Tells the story of how the slave trade operated: the terrible conditions endured by Africans on the feared Middle Passage across the Atlantic and the lives they led in the Americas.





LIFE IN AFRICA

A glimpse of the richness and importance of Africa's long and complex cultural history, featuring fascinating objects from the collections.




In traditional Igbo culture, the most important building in a family compound was the Obi, or man's meeting house. Gain an insight into village life in this compound which has been partially recreated.






MUSIC DESK

LEGACY



In 2011 the International Slavery Museum Research and Education Centre will open in the 19th century Dock Traffic Office next to Merseyside Maritime Museum.


Connected to the galleries by an enclosed glass bridge, the Research and Education Centre will provide an expansion of the museum by offering opportunities to focus on transatlantic slavery, comparative studies and programming that will explore wider aspects of slavery, both geographically and historically. It will become, over time, one of the world's leading research institutes in the field of human rights.

Working in partnership with communities, the centre will be a venue for public events including performing arts, lectures and debates. It will include exhibition space within which contemporary slavery issues will be explored.
