Revealing Histories Thomas Clarkson - one of the noblest of Englishmen Zerbanoo Gifford, leading antislavery campaigner, inspirational woman and author of Thomas Clarkson and the Campaign Against Slavery, will introduce the work of the 19th Century abolitionist in the venue where he made some of his greatest speeches. Zerbanoo's talk will focus on the relevance of Clarkson's campaign in combating slavery today. Zerbanoo is a patron of numerous international organisations, founder Director of the ASHA Foundation and was awarded a fellowship from NESTA in 2004 for her project 'Women: A World of Inspiration'

Revealing Histories This Accursed Thing

If slavery was the foundation of prosperity and Empire, what does that mean to us today? If cotton was the life-blood of Manchester. does it matter how it got here? A powerful promenade performance around the Museum explores these issues, and looks into the Trans-Atlantic slave trade, "this accursed thing", through the eyes of the people who were there. The performance explores the issues as seen by abolitionists and traders, slavers and slaves, revealing histories of both artefacts and individuals.
